Sugar Contract guaranteed 1. Taiwan Sugar Corporation contracts with farmers according to the Rules Governing the Contract Sugar Business of Taiwan Province to purchase sugar cane and share the prices of sugar made thereof with farmers. Because cane sugar has two prices, one for export and the other for domestic sale, sugar cane farmers' income is of two types:
 (1) Domestic sales, if the price is higher than the prepaid contract price, the whole of the domestic sale price goes to the farmers; if the domestic sale price is lower than the prepaid price, the farmers keep the prepaid price.
 (2) Export sale, if the export sale price is higher than the export guarantee price, the whole of the export price goes to the farmers; if the export price is lower than the export guarantee price, the farmers can get the export guaranteed price.
 2. Formula for calculation of sugar internal support:
 (1) domestic sale
 (contract prepaid price - external price) x domestic sale volume
 (2) export part
 (export guarantee price - external price) x export volume
 (3) external price
 3. other sugar subsidies

Summary of Guaranteed Price Distribution and Transportation
Plan for Summer Vegetables

I. Background

In order to meet the domestic demand for summer vegetables, promote specialized production and orderly distribution, ensure reasonable income for the farmers, and stabilize supply of vegetables, the Department of Agriculture since 1976 has implemented the Contract Guaranteed Price Distribution and Transportation Plan for Summer Vegetables, under which the wholesale markets at the places where consumption is high contract with farmers' organizations to set production targets and to ensure minimum prices in order to stabilize the supply of summer vegetables. The plan is initially implemented by the Taipei Fruit and Vegetable Wholesale market, and later by six other wholesale markets in Taiwan Province.

II. Source of Funds for Price Guarantee

The Fund for Summer vegetable Price Guarantee was established in 1979, and is governed by the Provisional Key Points for Management and Use of the Summer Vegetable Price Guarantee Fund. The contributors to the Fund are Council of Agriculture, the Department of Agriculture of Taiwan Provincial Government, Market Administrations of the Taipei City and Kaohsiung City, Farmers Association of Taiwan Province, Taiwan United Agricultural Cooperative, Taiwan Fruit and Vegetable Transportation and Distribution Cooperative, Taiwan Agricultural Transportation and Distribution Corporation, Kaohsiung Fruit and vegetable Transportation and Distribution Corporation, and fruit and vegetable wholesale markets in Taiwan Province.

III. Implementation Period

From June 1 to October 31 of each year.

IV. Farmers' Organizations Eligible for Participation in the Plan:

1. Those with sound organization, good records in joint transportation and distribution, and the type and quality of their products suit market demand,
2. helping the selection and grading of products for purposes of setting uniform prices, and
3. having been able to actually supply more than 50% of the target supply volume allocated to them or their monthly supplies meet 60% of the target volume at

Summary of the Plan for Adjusting the Supply and Demand of
Winter Vegetables

I. Purpose of the Plan:

When farmers plant vegetables according to the production plans approved by the relevant farmers' organization and suffer serious fall in prices due to weather conditions and the resulting imbalance between supply and demand, the government may depending on the actual circumstances take measures in the production place or designated key markets to adjust the demand and supply in order to stabilize the vegetable prices.

II. Implementation Period:

From November of each year to May of the next year.

III. Implementation Time:

If the Department of Agriculture based on the supply condition of each kind of vegetable and the price trend determines that the vegetable prices are apparently below the production cost, it will send to the county or city governments by fax its instruction to assist the farmers organizations and the wholesale markets at the production places in taking measures.

IV. Measures Taken:

1. Processing of the surplus:

- (1) This measure covers cauliflower, broccoli, baby cucumber, cabbage, sweet maize, spinach, snap beans, big stem mustard, radish, and carrots.
- (2) The farmers' organizations or the wholesale markets at the production places shall assist the farmers in transporting the surplus to the food plants for processing.

2. Storage of the surplus:

- (1) This measure covers cabbage, Chinese cabbage, onion, radish, carrots, and sweet maize.
- (2) Farmers' organizations that are equipped with freezers shall give priority to the storage of the surplus, or purchase such surplus at the main production places.
- (3) The statistics relating to the amount stored or the storage capacity offered to farmers shall

be sent by fax to the local government and the Department of Agriculture on a daily basis.

- (4) The stored vegetables cannot be released during the adjustment period without the prior consents of the local government and the Department of Agriculture.

3. Supervising the Adjustment in the Supply:

- (1) During the adjustment period, farmers' organizations shall limit the supply of good quality vegetables to Taipei Agricultural Transportation and Distribution Corporation and designated wholesale markets; this will be announced by the farmers' organization at the provincial level.
- (2) Local wholesale markets shall defer the disposal of good quality vegetables.

V. Termination Time:

The Department of Agriculture based on the supply condition and price trend shall determine the termination date and send its determination to each city or county government by fax and the farmers' organization at the provincial level.

VI. Financial Assistance:

Financial assistance is granted to farmers and units responsible for the handling of purchase for processing or storage of surplus for transportation cost. The criteria for granting such assistance depends on the kind of vegetable involved and are separately announced.

VII. Source of Fund:

The funds for 1994 are from the Department of Agriculture's budget; from 1995 onwards, the funds will be from the budgets of the central, provincial and the relevant county or city governments.

- (1) Advertising through radio, television, film, video, newspaper, billboard, poster, leaflet, notification, announcement, reference manual, sample, posting, display or in any other written, illustrated form or item.
- (2) Using discount as a form of promotion.
- (3) Using other items as gift or prize for selling tobacco products. However, situations where the price of the gift or prize is under one-quarter of the price of the tobacco products shall be excluded.
- (4) Using tobacco products as gift or prize for the sale of other products.
- (5) Packaging tobacco products together with other products for sale.
- (6) Distributing tobacco products in individual form, in loose packs or packed.
- (7) Sponsoring or organizing sports, cultural or any other events under the brand name of the tobacco products.
- (8) Sponsoring or organizing tasting events, concerts and lectures under the brand name of the tobacco products.
- (9) Any other methods determined to be unlawful and announced by the competent authority at the central government level.

Manufacturers, importers or retailers of tobacco products using periodicals as medium for the promotion and advertising of tobacco products shall not place more than one hundred and twenty items per year on the periodicals. In addition, such items shall not be placed in periodicals where the primary readers are juveniles under the age of eighteen.

Principles Governing Post Award Contract Dispute Resolution

Guiding Principles Governing Post-Contract Award Dispute Settlement

The Public Construction Commission (PCC) will play a constructive role in improvement of post award contract dispute procedures.

With the goal of assuring the transparency, uniformity and integrity of Chinese Taipei's procurement procedures including means of redress, the PCC will provide clear guidance to procuring entities on terms and conditions to be mandated for incorporation in all public contracts of a value above the threshold for publication. This guidance will include requirements to use, to the fullest extent possible, standard and internationally recognized contract terms and conditions.

In the area of post award contract dispute settlement, the PCC will establish that mediation as well as binding arbitration are available as mechanisms for the resolution of post-contract disputes and will actively encourage PCC mediation of such disputes.

The PCC will establish procedures for mediation and arbitration, applicable to government contracts, which shall supplement the provisions of the Commercial Arbitration Act. Such procedures shall provide for simple, standard terms and conditions which set out clear, time-limited steps to commence proceedings. Additionally, the PCC shall encourage its personnel to serve in functional capacities in support of arbitral proceedings such as serving as expert witnesses or offering advisory opinions on factual issues which may be in dispute.

With regard to disputes addressed through litigation, Chinese Taipei will encourage reliance by the courts on PCC personnel to serve as expert witnesses or other capacities supportive of the proceeding.

The PCC will also issue guidelines that assure that contractors seeking dispute settlement will not face any form of retaliation by procuring entities that would affect the contractors' ability to bid on pending or subsequent projects undertaken by the same or any other agency.
